Description of the Program

The Counseling Program is housed in the Department of Counseling and Educational Psychology in the College of Education at New Mexico State University. It is a 60 credit hour program that leads to a Masters of Arts in Counseling and Guidance.

The Counseling Program is accredited in Mental Health Counseling by the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP). Graduates from the Program are prepared to apply to be licensed as Professional Counselors and as School Counselors in New Mexico.

The Program prepares students to work with clients in a pluralistic society. Multicultural sensitivity and a developmental perspective are emphasized. The faculty, students and Las Cruces community are rich in cultural diversity.

A limited number of Graduate assistantships are available for MA Counseling Program students. Employment opportunities are also available in the community.



Course Work

Courses are offered in a block schedule. This means that students proceed through the Program as a cohort, taking course with the same group of students with whom they entered the Program.

Students may complete the program on a full, three-quarter, or half-time basis. All entering students must declare at the time of their application their intention to pursue full-time (24 months), three-quarter-time (30 months), or half-time (36 months) study.

The Counseling Program maintains low faculty-student ratios, particularly in courses where individual and small-group supervision are offered.

Students complete 1,000 hours of supervised practice while progressing through the program. Clinical training experiences begin the first semester with live supervision in the counseling training center, and continue each semester. Advanced counseling practicum is offered in schools, and internship experiences are provided through local mental health agencies.

Opportunities to pursue research are available through an optional master's thesis and structured independent studies with faculty members. Students may also acquire minors in specialty areas while progressing through the Program.

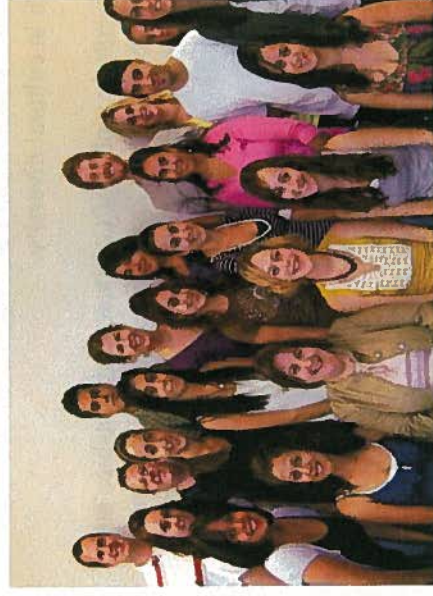

School Psychology at NMSU

- Students enrolled in the Program for School Psychology (SPP) at New Mexico State University are trained as school psychologists to work with teachers and other school professionals as well as parents and families to promote the mental health and academic development of all children and adolescents. The SPP is housed in and administered through the Department of Counseling and Educational Psychology (CEP) resulting in the granting of a Specialist in Education (Ed.S.) degree in school psychology from the CEP department. The School Psychology Program is supported by contributions from the Department of Special Education/Communication Disorders (SPED).
- The program is accredited by the National Association of School Psychologists (NASP), the only accredited program in the state of New Mexico. All graduates meet the standards of NASP and the school psychology licensure criteria for the state of New Mexico.
- The terminal degree Specialist in Education (Ed.S.), provides advanced training beyond the masters degree, but not as advanced as the doctorate. Applicants who hold a masters degree in a related field will, at a minimum, complete 30 graduate semester hours to be granted the Ed.S. Applicants who do not hold a masters degree will complete a minimum of 60 graduate semester hours.

Commitment to Diversity

The school psychology program is committed to increasing its number of graduate students from a variety of diverse backgrounds, including race, ethnicity, gender identity, sexual orientation, or disability. Applicants from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds are urged to apply.

Life in Las Cruces

Las Cruces, New Mexico's second largest city, blends Latino, American Indian, African American, and European cultures. In addition, the city's rich history makes it a prime location for the multicultural focus of the program. The area is well known for the majestic Organ Mountains, White Sands National Monument, and the Rio Grande River, which winds its way through fields of chile, cotton, and pecan orchards. Desert landscape, high forested mountains, and the proximity of the U.S./Mexican border contribute to the rich natural resources of the region. Additionally, the cost of living is below the national average, allowing students to live a more affordable lifestyle.

Counseling Psychology at NMSU

The Counseling Psychology program at NMSU was first accredited by the American Psychological Association (APA) in 1995, and was reaccredited in 2005 for a period of seven years with the next site visit occurring in 2012. (For more information on accreditation, contact the Office of Program Consultation and Accreditation, APA, 750 1st st NE, Washington, DC 20002, 202-336-5979). The program, housed within the College of Education, offers educational experiences in the foundations of scientific psychology (history & systems of psychology, biological, cognitive/affective, individual and social bases of behavior) as applied within the discipline of counseling psychology. The program is based on the scientist-practitioner model and emphasizes the integration of theory, research, and practice.

Students complete a practicum each semester where theory is applied to a variety of counseling modalities. The program fosters an increased sensitivity to, and competence in serving, a culturally diverse society. Multicultural aspects of theory, practice, and research are infused throughout the program. Students have an opportunity to teach, counsel, and conduct research with a diverse student population. The department sponsors the Counseling and School Psychology Training Center with state of the art video equipment where students counsel, assess, supervise, and conduct research.

Doctoral students are assigned a faculty advisor who will mentor their research efforts and chair their dissertation. Students present their research projects at a multicultural research symposium during their second year. Students also are mentored in teaching by assisting faculty with undergraduate classes, eventually teaching their own classes.

The ethical code of the America Psychological Association is stressed throughout the program. Completion of the Ph.D. Program typically requires three years of full-time course work and one year devoted to pre-doctoral internship and working on a dissertation.

Students develop knowledge and skills in the following areas:

- appraisal of personality and intelligence
- diagnosis and treatment planning
- individual, family and group counseling
- child and adolescent counseling
- vocational psychology
- addictions counseling
- ethics and professional issues
- consultation and supervision
- research and statistics

Graduate Assistantships

The program provides some form of graduate assistantships to all students. First year graduate assistants typically assist faculty with undergraduate courses, 2nd year students may teach a course independently, and 3rd year students have opportunities for administrative and supervisory assignments in the departmental training center. Award of a graduate assistantship makes the student eligible for in-state tuition.

Life in Las Cruces

Las Cruces is located in southern New Mexico, 50 miles from El Paso and Juarez, Mexico. The majestic Organ Mountains accentuate one's travels throughout Las Cruces. White Sands National Monument is close at hand, as is the Rio Grande River which winds its way through fields of chile, cotton and pecan orchards. The mild climate allows for year round swimming, golf, backpacking and explorations of New Mexico's many antiquities and cultural treasures. Cultural events include the Renaissance Arts & Crafts Festival, The Whole Enchilada Festival, Diez-y-Seis de Septiembre celebrations, Mariachi Conference, and a variety of events sponsored by the American Southwest Theatre Company and the Las Cruces Symphony.

Las Cruces, hometown of the university and New Mexico's second largest city, blends Hispanic, American Indian, African American, and White cultures. Winter sports are available ninety minutes away in the mountain communities of Ruidoso and Cloudcroft. Desert landscape, the fabled Rio Grande, high forested mountains, and the proximity of the U.S./Mexico border contribute to the rich multicultural ambiance of the region.
